fourth floor, and to make space for the department, Mann Library consolidated its stacks onto its second and third floors this summer. The library based its plans to move around stacks on a study that

assessed factors like the reduced need for stacks space and the need for more functional office space, according to Peter Schrempf, program manager of Capital Projects and Facilities Services. The study was conducted in conjunction with Mann Library, the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences and the College of Human Ecology and the Central Library Administration in order to make sure the spatial needs of the colleges were being met, he said.
